Notes from Eacan Timber

Now it is time to play the what if game. US President Elect Donald Trump is saying that he may consider applying upward of 25% tariffs on all imports to the United States from Canada and Mexico. That includes lumber. We have been having conversations with our customers in the United States about these potential tariffs. There seems to be some confusion as to whether or not he will actually impose these tariffs.

We have suggested to our US customers, and they have agreed, that we ship their January/February lumber to them prior to January 20th. If tariffs are imposed on Day 1, there will be confusion and interruption at the border to say the least. It will take some time to figure out the complexities. In any case, ultimately, any increase will be passed 0nto the consumer. This proactive, rather than reactive approach, will give us time to move forward in March. Fingers crossed. In the meantime, you folks are working on a healthy order file and things look good for the New Year.

Notes from Woodlands

As 2024 is wrapping up and we look back, our attention has been on several themes during the year. With limited space, I will touch on a couple.

Efforts continued with cleaning up tropical storm Fiona damaged forest stands. As the wood continued to degrade, challenges around harvesting and utilizing the fibre increased as most of the trees damaged during the storm are now considered "low grade" material. Although there are programs available to help the contractor with the cost side of harvesting low grade stands, limited markets for the fibre have presented further challenges. Along with those challenges, another concern is that every operation focused on harvesting low grade wood results in a reduction of harvesting capacity focused on producing saw logs and studs. It is very important to clean up as much of the affected areas as possible, however, with most sawmills having experienced a reduction in deliveries over the last few months this balance will be a delicate one until the cleanup efforts wrap up.

Notes from Woodlands, con't

On a related topic, another theme in the forest industry that some have been focused on in 2024 has been the feasibility around partial harvesting treatments, particularly commercial thinning. Being an important part of a thinning series implemented during the rotation of a managed forest; commercial thinning is also a vulnerable one. Many stands commercially thinned in Nova Scotia have been damaged during wind events. Losing fibre at this stage is especially hard hitting in terms of forest management. Much investment is put into these stands at that point, and where they are approaching, yet short of optimal sized saw logs, to lose them at this stage is a blow to utilization and sustainability. There does not seem to be a perfect solution, as every site is different, and how the treated areas react to wind events is somewhat unpredictable. However, with an obvious need to try a different approach, we have put forth efforts over the last year to do just that. These efforts include thinning stands earlier and shorter, using smaller equipment to reduce trail width, and thinning using a patch/trail system to remove what should be removed but ensuring vulnerable areas are not opened too much.

Time will tell how, or if, these adjustments will pay off. Forestry is very much a long game, however the decisions we make now can result in outcomes that pay off in the long run.

There never seems to be a dull moment in the forest industry, so I have no doubt 2025 will be another interesting one.
